There are only 20 tickets for each trip!








Shadow Puppet projects

Year 11 Walton-on-the-Naze Fieldwork

The Year 11 Geographers braved some very unpleasant weather to complete their coastal fieldwork in Walton-on-the-Naze this November.

The students have studied coastal erosion in the classroom and this was an opportunity for them to see a range of methods for protecting the coast and to get an understanding of what factors influence decisions on how to defend certain areas.

We started the day by climbing up the Naze Tower; this gave the students the opportunity to see how erosion rates are rapidly cutting away at the cliffs north of the town and to compare that with the heavily defended beach to the south. They could also see how the size of houses changed as we moved into the town centre.

After the tower, we

walked into the town. On Tuesday, due to the strong winds we didn't down onto the go beach and instead the students focussed their attention to the changes in services and housing as we walked from the outskirts of Walton to the high The group was street. quick to spot the change in garden sizes and potential value of homes but they also identified that there were far more services (bus stops, play grounds, shops, etc.) as we got closer to the town centre.

On Wednesday, the weather brightened up so we were able to walk along the beach, completing surveys of the defences and the rates of erosion. The students found that sand and silt is being carried up the coast but that the defences are doing a good job of



slowing this down and protecting the town.

On both days the students were encouraged to speak to members of the public. Despite the inclement weather, the students were able to survey a large number of residents and we received numerous compliments on their manners and how friendly they were. As staff, we were very impressed with both groups, particularly with how incredibly cheerful positive the and Tuesday group was, despite some really horrible conditions. Well done!!

"I think I've benefited from this course because I have a much clearer understanding of what to expect after my school life."


"I feel this course has helped me realise and know the benefits of being financially stable. The mentors really helped me learn more from what I already knew."

Games Club



'Fun Run' week

In the last two weeks before the Christmas break, our KS3 students took part in the "Fun Run" week.

What is this all about? The aim of the 'Fun Run' was for students to participate in a slow, that long run retrospectively stimulates an active lifestyle and urges them to experiment with their aerobic capacity. Furthermore, this type of exercise has many benefits, although it is most commonly known for increasing muscle strength and improving the cardiovascular and respiratory system functions.

Through the PE lesson, the students challenged their aerobic capability, tested their stamina, while constantly competing with themselves in a game of endurance.

Some students exceeded themselves and ran at a steady pace for 30 min and, while this was not accomplished by everyone, it was a thrilling moment watching them support each other's effort and enjoying to the fullest.

They showed great aerobic ability and unparalleled determination throughout the PE lesson. Well done!

Finally, during their experience at the 'Fun Run', the students gathered some tips that can help a beginner runner.

Let's bear in mind the 3 tips for the long run:

1) Keep a steady pace if you do not want to run

out of energy.

2) Pace yourself, if you do not know what is the appropriate speed, start with low speed and pick up speed gradually.

When breathing, 3) inhale and exhale using both your nose and mouth combined. Breathing through both the mouth and the nose will keep your breathing steady and engage your diaphragm for maximum oxygen intake. It also allows you to expel carbon dioxide quickly.



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
