

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Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers

As we come to the end of another half term at Connaught School for Girls, there is much to celebrate. Despite the ongoing challenges, we continue to thrive and grow as you'll see from the articles in this newsletter. The students have really shown their resilience this term. There has been some illness, but, on the whole, the school is buzzing with activity and learning.

There is still some covid related anxiety in the school. We have employed counsellors in the school, as well as a good pastoral programme to help to deal with the worries that some of our students still have. We continue to plan our recovery, with your child's health and safety front and centre of our work. If your child needs support of any kind, please continue to talk to them and encourage them to share any worries with either their form tutors or one of the Designated Safeguarding Leads in the school (Ms Hickes, Ms Stewart, Mr Silk, Ms Masella or myself).

Thank you to all the parents who attended the virtual Year 11 Parents' evening on the 26th of January. The girls, who received their mock exams results earlier this term, are now focusing on preparing for their final exams. As you will be aware, exams are going ahead this year, which I'm sure you'll agree is the best way forward. The staff and students are working very hard to prepare for these. We are acutely aware of the impact of the pandemic on our students, so have already worked on a 'Plan B' if, for any reason, your child needs to fall back on assessment done in school.

In preparation for the exams, there will be details of half term and Easter revision sessions coming out very soon. Please encourage your child to take part in these, in order to help them prepare for the finals. As a parent myself, I understand how stressful this time is. Please support your child by encouraging them to make a revision timetable and carefully plan how to organise their time between now and the finals. The staff at school will help with this; it's really important to start slowly now, and then build up to the final exams themselves.

Staying with enrichment and extracurricular activities, our clubs and activities have been relaunched. There is a growing range of activities at lunchtime and after school that your child can take part in. I really believe that it is important for our students to attend these. Our job, as educators, is to educate the whole child; exams results are important but so too are the skills and experiences that can be had when involved in these types of activities. Please encourage your child to take part.

As we learn to live with the pandemic, we will be relaxing some of our covid restrictions. After half term, it will no longer be compulsory to wear masks in the

classrooms. We will also be reintroducing assemblies; it is a really important part of school life to meet collectively so that important messages and themes can be shared and explored together.

We've been listening to our students too! Following requests and suggestions from the students themselves, we are installing ablution facilities for our Muslim students so that they can prepare properly for prayers in a new prayer room, which will hopefully meet the demand. We will keep this under review.

I want to thank you all for your continuing support of the school. I hope that you have a peaceful, safe and relaxing half term break.

term. Connaught This School for Girls were delighted to have been able to take a group of students on a day visit to Oxford University, St Peter's College. The students were given a tour around the college, engaged in a Q+A session with some first year students and finally tasted a short lecture on sustainability. Here's what some students had to say about the visit.

"In my view, the trip was definitely beneficial. At the start, one professor had explained the basics which included debunking myths about

uni and making with comfortable the area. Then, three undergraduate students gave us a tour of the campus, specifically the library and common rooms. They also spoke about their individual experiences, which was something I was most looking forward to because we were similar in age. This meant they were going through University life, so we could ask questions about how they coped with studies/ interviews, etc. Later on, another student gave us a "taster" of what a tutorial/lecture would look like - a presentation on Civil engineering and sustainability. This was most informative but also helped create a better image of the "real thing" in the future. Overall, I do appreciate this opportunity as it gave me an insight into uni life and makes me feel that little bit more confident about continuing my studies."



Film club will then focus on Spanish, for a different year group.





