Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parent/Carer

It looks like we made it! What a year this has been for all of us. As a mother of two, I absolutely know what this year has been like for all the families in our community. I understand the strain of lockdown as a parent and the immense amount of work you have all had to do in juggling your work with that of your children whilst trying to stay positive. So I'd like to say a huge 'thank you' from all of us at Connaught for our joint partnership in educating your daughters. I'm really proud of how the whole school community has come together; from online learning to testing at home. We've adapted quickly and kept going through the difficult days; we did it together.

Times have been tough. We've all been affected by the pandemic in some way and we've had to make some really tough decisions. Throughout all of it, I want you to know that at the heart of every decision are the students themselves. Our biggest priority is to ensure that your child is safe, looked after and cared for. Like you, we have worked hard to mitigate the worst of the pandemic to make sure that school is as normal as possible. At Connaught, we have very high expectations and we've worked relentlessly to meet those expectations and keep our school as a place where our students thrive. I want to reassure you that any decisions we've made regarding postponing or cancelling events have been done with a very heavy heart and always following the latest government guidance.

Despite all of this, we've had a busy term which you can see for yourselves from this bumper newsletter. In Maths, our Key stage three students have been treated to a visit from the Happy Puzzle Company, challenging them to mind-boggling conundrums to keep the grey cells busy. The testimonials from the day say it all!

In Drama, I was delighted to read the evocative poetry from Year 9 following my Refugee assembly. As a refugee myself, I was moved to read the 'We come from' poems that explore cultural identity; a great exercise in creative writing but also raising cultural awareness and diversity. Well done to them all!

On that note, I was honoured to be invited to speak to 10G about my own experience as a child refugee from Uganda. Their questions were tough but I was happy to share what it was like to settle in this country following a traumatic departure from my birth place. It helped to raise awareness of what it feels like to

come to this country as a refugee or asylum seeker and the feedback from them was great. It also helped promote the idea of tolerance and dialogue in a constructive way.

As we move to Step 4 in the easing of lockdown, we've started to take tentative steps to take our students outside the classroom. It was great to hear about the Year 10s History visit to the Science Museum where they had a lovely day exploring the museum and finding out about the history of medicine. Similarly our intrepid Geographers have been venturing out with the Year 10 field trip to Walton on the Naze and our Year 8s discovering Wanstead Park, right on their doorstep, with some wading into the river and getting a bit of fresh air too! We want to encourage much more of that.

All of these activities (and more) show that the school is a vibrant place, where the buzz of learning echoes around the corridors. Whilst the pandemic consumes so much of life outside of school, at Connaught we are busy with the job of learning, which, despite the events of the last year, has not dampened our spirit or enthusiasm.

And so, as we reach the end of the academic year, our thoughts turn to next year. As we move to Step 4 and the opening up of society following the lockdown, we are busy reviewing our risk assessments. You'll be aware that we will constantly need to review our measures as we move into the autumn term and, if there are changes, we will be in touch. As it stands, we are looking forward to a normal timetable, with the same start/end times for all students. We are also expecting all students to be in full uniform every day, bringing in their PE kits to change into at the appropriate times. Additionally, before we begin the term, we will be offering Asymptomatic Testing to all students prior to starting lessons. Please see the (new) website and letters to parents for full details on the arrangements for the start of term.

The summer holidays have been long awaited and hard earned. Please urge your daughter to take the time to rest, recuperate and recover. Next year will be the road to recovery and normality; we can't wait to begin that in partnership with you and your daughter. Have a wonderful summer and stay well.



Year 10 Walton-onthe-Naze Visit



During the day, the students carried out measurements of the coastal defences at Walton and measured the current of the sea to identify what processes t a k e p I a c e there. Students also spoke to local residents and tourists to find out what they think about the town and its character. The students were really wellmannered and respectful throughout the visit and staff received lots of questions and compliments about the school and the work our students were doing.

The visit was a real success; students gained a real understanding of how the coastline is changing and the

Year 8 Wanstead Park Visit

At the end of June, the Year 8s had the chance to practise their fieldwork skills on a meander of the River Roding in Wanstead Park. The new Geography GCSE places much more emphasis on the importance of fieldwork and expects students to have a solid grasp of how to collect data. To prepare them for this, we decided to take them out of school and give them some experience of this side of the subject.

Each form group completed the trip on a separate day. We travelled to Wanstead via the Central Line before walking into Wanstead Park. For most of the students, this was their first visit to the park and they first were amazed that this was on their doorstep.

Once we arrived in the park we walked to a where meander the students were to complete their tests. Wellies were crucial so that we could actually carry out the surveys and as, on most of the days, the weather was warm. The students loved being able to get into the river, particularly those who had the chance to borrow the school waders!

Uniform

Navy blue blazer with school logo embroidered on the pocket

Plain white cotton shirt, long or short sleeved

Optional navy blue v necked jumper (no school logo required)

Tie (KS3 navy with gold stripes/KS4 gold with navy stripes). To be worn to the skirt/trouser waistband.

Navy blue kilt style skirt (shortest length - just above the knee, longest length - ankle) or navy blue tailored trousers with a waistband (no belt)

Plain navy or black socks (ankle or knee length) or plain navy or black tights

Hair

Hair styles and colours must be discreet and natural. Any planned hairstyle or colour, which is likely to stand out, should be discussed with your Head of Year before you go ahead. Hair ties/bands must be navy blue or black and small and discreet.

Jewellery

The following are not permitted:

Necklaces and bracelets (other than Sikh Kara)

Rings

Nose piercings or any other form of facial piercing, including the tongue (plasters covering piercings are not allowed NB Nose/cartilage piercings take 4-6 months to heal before initial piercing can be removed)

Nail varnish, nail extensions or acrylics

Braid accessories e.g. silver/gold clips/beads

Hoodies, sweatshirts and sports tops (these should also not be worn as a coat)



School Street Consultation Connaught School for Girls



Waltham Forest Council, in partnership with Connaught School for Girls, are holding a consultation for a School Street trial. Please give your feedback by **30 July 2021**.



We are writing to you to find out your views on a proposal to introduce a trial School Street at Connaught School for Girls.

What is a School Street?

A School Street is an initiative to create safer streets for everyone by reducing traffic congestion and improving local air quality. School Streets involve temporarily closing one or more roads surrounding a school to most vehicles for a short period at the start and end of the school day.

What are the benefits of a School Street?

Restricting vehicle movements around Connaught School for Girls at the start and end of the school day should have the following benefits for the school community and local residents:

- Improved road safety for all road users;
- A reduction in anti-social behaviour from inconsiderate parking and dangerous vehicle movements;
- Fewer vehicles on the school run, which will reduce traffic and make it easier for pupils, parents, carers and staff to walk, scoot and cycle to school;
- Improved air quality around the school gates due to reduced vehicle idling.

Why is this School Street being proposed?

The council works closely with schools across the borough as part of the Transport for London STARS School Travel Plan programme to encourage more pupils, parents and staff to walk, scoot or cycle to school. For schools that suffer from high levels of traffic congestion, parking issues or idling concerns, despite showing high levels of commitment to the TfL STARS programme, School Streets can be implemented as an additional measure to help reduce traffic congestion and improve local air quality outside the school.

Due to Connaught School for Girls' ongoing road safety issues despite a commitment to promoting active travel, a School Street trial is being proposed to determine whether this will improve road safety, reduce air pollution and increase the number of pupils travelling actively to school. We are now seeking the views of residents, local businesses and parents on the proposal.

What roads will be included and when?

We are consulting on two proposals for the trial scheme.

Proposal 1:

The roads where vehicles would be restricted at the start and end of the school day include:

- Dyers Hall Road
- Dyers Hall Road South
- Connaught Road
- Madeira Road.

Proposal 2:

The roads where vehicles would be restricted at the start and end of the school day include:

- Dyers Hall Road
- Dyers Hall Road South

BBB

- Connaught Road
- Madeira Road

• Drayton Road (between Grove Green Road and Fillebrook Road).

Please refer to the two enclosed maps for plans of both proposals.

Restrictions will be enforced, Monday to Friday, term time only

(not including bank holidays), between;

- 7:45am and 8.30am
- 2:45pm and 3:30pm

During the restricted times above, the roads listed would be made into a pedestrian and cycle only zone. Motor vehicles will not be permitted to enter the pedestrian and cycle zone between these



times unless the vehicle has a valid "exemption". Road signs will be displayed at all entry and exit points to the pedestrian and cycle zone advising of the restrictions (an example is shown to the right).

How would the School Street be enforced?

The scheme will be enforced using Vehicle Registration Mark cameras. A camera will be placed at the entrance of each of the affected roads. Please refer to the enclosed map for a plan of the camera locations. The restrictions will be supported by legal Traffic Management Orders and any vehicles that are not exempt but travel into the zone will be issued with a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN). The cost of the PCN will be £130, which will be reduced to £65 if paid within 14 days.

Who would be exempt from the restriction?

At present the following road users would be exempt from the restriction:

- Residents living within the School Streets zone;
- Registered carers for residents living within the School Streets zone who notify the Council of their vehicle's details;
- Businesses and their staff located within the School Streets zone who notify the Council of their vehicle's details;
- School staff accessing the school car park or using a valid parking permit for the LSW Controlled Parking Zone;
- Blue Badge holders that require access to an address within the School Streets zone (this can apply for the holder, or for a third party on behalf of the holder). The Blue Badge holder must contact the Council using the contact details below to arrange their exemption in advance;
- Emergency services;
- Vehicles providing transport to medical appointments;
- Volunteers delivering food/medical supplies to residents who are self-isolating due to COVID-19;
- Dial-a-Ride and Community Transport services;
- · Royal Mail vehicles;
- Council waste services;
- Trades vehicles who are providing a service to a property or business within the School Streets zone. The resident or tradesperson must contact us in advance to provide the vehicle registration and approximate duration of works so that a temporary exemption can be arranged;
- Any vehicle already parked in the School Streets zone when the restriction commences will be able to leave without penalty.

This is not an exhaustive list and other exemption requests will be considered.

Parents of pupils at the school, visitors, deliveries and general through traffic will not be exempt from the restriction.

How would I be able to apply for an exemption?

If you are a resident or business owner living within the School Streets zone on one of the restricted roads, you would be eligible for a free School Streets permit.

If you already have a CPZ permit, you would automatically receive a virtual School Streets permit via your RingGo account and would not need to take any action yourself.

If you own a vehicle but do not have a CPZ permit (e.g. you have off-street parking), you would need to apply for a free virtual School Streets permit yourself.

When would the trial start and how long will it last?

Subject to the feedback we receive as part of this consultation we expect that the trial would start in September 2021 and run until the school's summer holiday in July 2022.

How would the trial be assessed?

The trial would be assessed in the following ways:

- Traffic volume and speed data collected before and during the trial in the School Streets zone and surrounding roads.
- Air quality data (Nitrogen Dioxide and particulate matter) collected before and during the trial on the listed roads and the surrounding area;
- Travel surveys with pupils to assess the change in pupil travel behaviour. These would be taken before and during the trial;
- Regular observations of parking behaviour in both the School Streets zone and those immediately surrounding the restricted area;
- Formal feedback from the school community including any issues and concerns;
- Feedback from residents and businesses in the School Streets zone and in the immediate surrounding area.

What else would be happening?

We would offer pupils, parents and staff complementary initiatives to help them travel more actively and sustainably to school. These would include cycle training, bike maintenance and route planning sessions, which should further contribute to the reduction of vehicles in the vicinity of the school.

Frequently Asked Questions

• I have a visitor coming, would they be eligible for a permit?

No, we do not provide permits or exemptions for general visitors as the primary aim of the School Street is to reduce the number of vehicles in the vicinity of the school to improve road safety and reduce congestion.

• Would I be able to appeal a PCN if I had an emergency?

If you require a visitor to attend in an emergency (e.g. you require transport to hospital), you would need to contact us via email or phone, within 24 hours of them attending to let us know this.

• I have a district nurse or carer that comes to visit me. What would happen to them?

Registered carers and district nurses can be exempted from the restrictions however we would need to be made aware of this via email or phone, within 24 hours of them attending. If they are a regular carer or nurse we can arrange a permanent exemption for them.

· I'm expecting a delivery - what can I do?

Many companies now offer specific time slots for deliveries which should allow residents to schedule deliveries outside of the restricted times, and during the restricted times, delivery drivers can still make deliveries by parking outside of the restricted area and then making the delivery by foot. Royal Mail vehicles are exempt from the School Streets restrictions and you would therefore continue to receive post and deliveries from them during the operating hours of the School Street.

• I'm self-isolating due to COVID-19, how do I receive food and medical supplies?

If you are self-isolating due to COVID-19 and are receiving food or medical deliveries by vehicle, these would be exempt from the restrictions however we should be made aware of this via email or phone, within 24 hours of them attending.


• I live on a nearby road and often park my car on a road in the School Streets zone – would I be eligible for a permit?

No, only residents who live at an address within a School Streets zone would be eligible for a permit.



Dear Students, Parents and Carers,

Start of the Academic Year 2021-22

Before returning to school for the new academic year we are offering all students a Covid-19 Lateral Flow Test (LFT) on the school premises before their first day back in school and face-to-face lessons.

For current Connaught students returning in September, we will assume the parental consent given for the LFT testing that took place in March 2021. However, parents of current students can give or withdraw consent at any time. We <u>strongly encourage</u> all students to come into school to take their LFTs as a precaution to keep everyone in our community safe from coronavirus.

Students will be required to have a negative lateral flow test before attending their first day of face-to-face lessons in school the next school day after their first test. The testing process is not compulsory, however. Those students without consent to be tested will not be prevented from attending their first day of lessons in school. Those students that receive a positive LFT result must self isolate and book an NHS PCR test and if this result is negative they may return to school.

Students' first test will be at our Asymptomatic Test Site (ATS) and will be a visit to the ATS <u>only</u>, via the Dyers Hall Road entrance. Students should arrive at the Dyers Hall Road entrance (school uniform <u>not</u> required to be worn) for their first test by attending at the times on the following page and <u>go back</u> <u>home</u> once their test is complete to await their result by text, email or both.

First LFT Test Time at the School AST at Dyers Hall Road Entrance

- New Year 7 students 8:30am on Wednesday 1st September 2021
- Year 8 students 11am on Wednesday 1st September 2021
- Year 9 students 8:30am on Thursday 2nd September 2021
- Year 10 students 11am on Thursday 2nd September 2021
- Year 11 students 1:30pm on Thursday 2nd September 2021

A second lateral flow test will be conducted in school 5 days after the first test. Following this second test in school, lateral flow test kits will be issued to students so testing can continue at home to identify asymptomatic cases and minimise virus transmission.
