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Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers,

What a lovely time of year! The trees are filled with blossom, the days are lighter and brighter and our students are a continued source of inspiration and pride! Last night we held our Iftar event and two of our students, Khadija Kousar and Meerub Fatima, gave speeches about Ramadan and the importance of inclusion at Connaught. They were absolutely brilliant and I could not have been more proud of our incredible students. It was a great event organised by Ms. Maniar and a number of our parent body and I wanted to say a special thankyou to Zeenat for all her time and energy and Riz at Eidparty for the fantastic decorations.

I also wanted to thank all the parents who baked for or attended our charity coffee morning for the Turkey/Syria Earthquake appeal. Samim and Debbie from our PTA did a brilliant job organising this event. It was lovely to meet so many of you and we have now raised over £1,000 for this charity. Much of this has been from student donations and I have been so impressed by the generosity and compassion demonstrated by Connaught Students.

This time of year also brings with it increased determination and focus from our year 11 students who are now on the countdown to their final GCSE examinations. The students are working incredibly hard and I know they will ensure their time is used wisely over the break. Whilst it is important to have some rest, it is also absolutely crucial at this time of year that year 11 have a clear revision timetable and are tackling their areas of weakness and asking for the help they need. There are a number of revision sessions taking place over the Easter break for year 11 as well as a study space available in the first week of the holiday which students can book into if they feel more able to focus on their revision at school. Year 10 will also be approaching their first set of formal mock examinations. The timetable for this has been published and I would strongly encourage you to go through this with your child and support them in allocating time to revise over the break.

I also wanted to update parents about the proposal to join a multi academy trust. I had previously written to parents to outline that the school was consulting on a proposal to form a MAT with Norlington, the Exceptional Educational Trust.

Further to extensive consultation and discussions, it has now been decided that this merger will not take place, although Connaught will continue, as we always have, to work closely with Norlington School. There are a number of other opportunities which we are considering in terms of partnerships and I will update you as soon as I have more information about this.

Liz Jackson, our vice chair will be stepping into this post. As a retired Headteacher and a governor at Gwyn Jones Primary School, I know she will bring a huge amount of valuable experience to the role. We are also delighted to have two new parent governors join us, Zak Sayed and Khurram Sair who both bring considerable expertise in their respective fields and will be an absolute asset as members of the governing body.

So, enjoy the break and the brighter days, I wish you a lovely Easter and to those fasting during this holy month I wish you Ramadan Kareem. I look forward to seeing you refreshed at the start of the Summer term.

Where researching women artists and feminism in art led to students creating pieces of Art which are based on women's campaigns.

In Geography-

Students have learned

In ICT-

Students have carried out research and presented on the first woman computer programmer.

In Form Time-

Students have watched short films and used inspirational quotes from women to generate discussions about the role of women in society.

It has been inspiring to see so many students being prepared to organise themselves and their learning with educators this month.

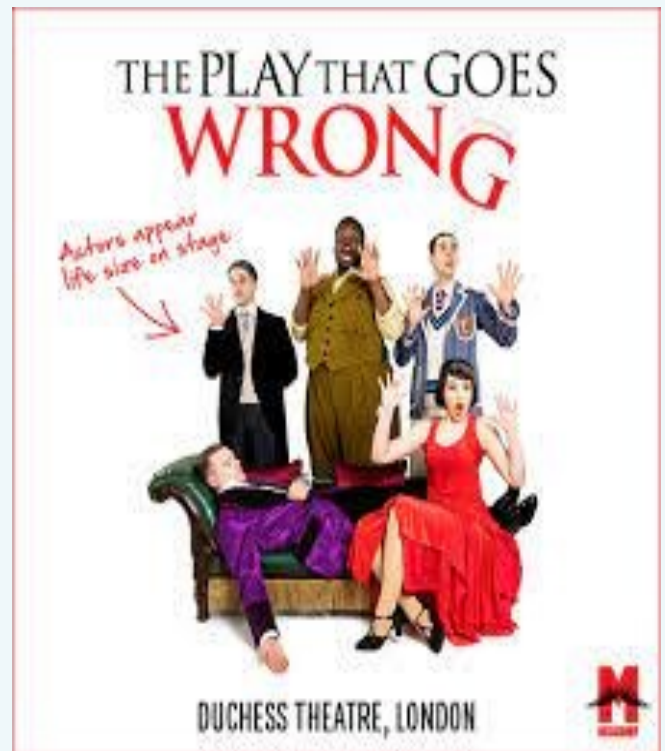

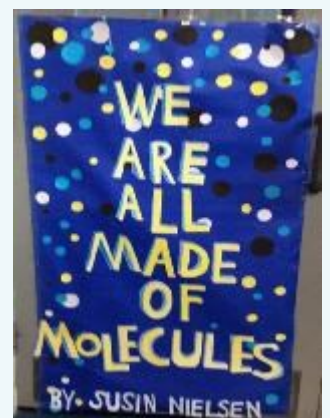
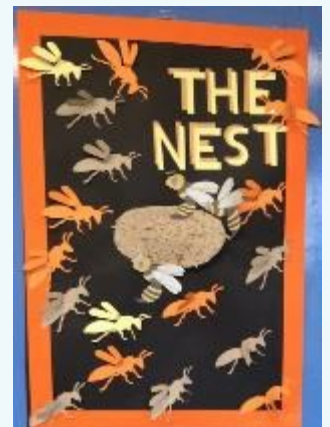
Door decorating competition
