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# Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers,

I wanted to open by telling you how much the students at Connaught School for Girls have impressed me this term by their determination, their resilience, their drive and their focus. Despite some challenges, our students have shown real commitment to their studies and as I walk around school, I am filled with admiration for the mature and ambitious approach to their studies our students demonstrate. Students across Year 11 in particular, have made a fantastic start to this year, they are already attending additional revision and support sessions and are very much focussed on achieving the best in their final year at Connaught. Well done year 11 and keep this up!

Meanwhile, outside of the classroom, our students have also demonstrated resilience and determination in the sporting arena, with many students excelling and beating school records in our Autumn sports day. Our Winter concert is currently in preparation and it is a delight to hear the musicality of the talented performers as the sound of rehearsals spills out of the music room and preparation for this year's drama performance, "Mehndi Night" are well underway with many students attending auditions to be part of this very special performance.

October is Black History Month and this was marked with a special student-led assembly, amongst other events. The students who delivered this demonstrated excellent public speaking skills. It is no easy feat to address over 300 young people but the students participating delivered their message with impressive confidence.

We had a very successful Open Evening this half term, our guides were Year 8 and Year 10 students and we were so impressed by the fabulous tours they delivered to Year 6 students and their families throughout the evening. We received so many compliments about the tours and I could not have been prouder of our polite, confident young people.

We have recently been approached by a number of local residents raising concerns about traffic on Grove Green Road at pick up and drop off times. As you are aware, the schoolstreets programme aims to reduce vehicles on the school run to reduce traffic and make it easier for pupils, parents, carers and staff to walk or cycle to school. It also aims to improve air quality near school by reducing waiting vehicles. Following on from the concerns raised by local residents, I have been advised that additional parking civil enforcement officers will be deployed in the area and I would urge all families to use alternative transport methods, wherever possible to avoid further congestion in our locality.

I also wanted to use this opportunity to reiterate my recent message to you at this difficult time as we witness the escalating crisis and humanitarian disaster in the Middle East. We will be continuing to collect for the charity chosen by our students, "Save the Children" and we will be providing further opportunities for students to discuss this both in humanities lessons and in some lunchtime drop ins after the half term break. We want to encourage students to do something constructive to show how they, and the school desire peace. Students who wish to can also complete a self - referral to our school counsellor should they wish to discuss any worries which they might have and our staff and especially tutors will continue to proactively look for ways to support our students..

I wanted to thank you for your patience whilst we navigate the current industrial action surrounding the proposal.



# Year 11 Walton-on-the -Naze fieldwork

As a part of the Geography GCSE, the students carried out fieldwork at Walton-on-the-Naze.

The students studied coastal erosion in the classroom and this was an opportunity for them to see a range of methods for protecting the coast and get an understanding of what factors influence how to defend certain areas. Their focus  $f \cap r$ the fieldwork was to look at change over time and mitigating risk which tied in really nicely with the location. We began the day by climbing the steps of the Naze Tower to get a panoramic view of the area. This gave the students an opportunity to see how erosion rates are rapidly cutting away at the cliffs north of the town and compare this heavily defended sections to the south of the tower. During the day the students walked from the Naze tower towards

the town collecting data, the coasts. Back at stopping off to have school the students are lunch on the sea wall. to use the data collected

After this, the students conducted surveys in the local community understand the impacts of coastal erosion on residents, businesses and environment how the residents have impacted time. The students also had the opportunity to look at the process of longshore drift in action and how the defences work to try and prevent sediment from moving down the beach. This carried out measuring the distance and time it took for oranges to move along

during the trip analyse the information creating a poster to present to their peers but also members of SLT to show off their coastal knowledge. I just wanted to say a big thank you to everyone and well done as during the day the students were excellent at taking data and listening even if the wind was blowing which made it harder to hear, but also well done for speaking to members of the public and being very polite while doing so.




