### International Womens' Day assembly

The assembly to KS3 on Monday was delivered by an ex-student to mark International Womens' Day. Amara Sharif came in and delivered an outstanding presentation on her time in Connaught School, her path and career and her great successes. Amara is a published author of a children's book which she wrote to feature an ethnically diverse female lead character. She explained the significance of publishing this, as these types of characters are hugely under-represented. Amara also brought in her award from the 'Asian Women of Achievement Award' she received in 2023 and talked about this with the assembly. It is always great to see ex-students back in the school to show our current students what they can achieve if they put their mind to it.

#### **Theatre visits**

This week we had 2 separate theatre visits. Year 10 students went to see Romeo and Juliet in the Globe theatre and they got to go to this brilliant performance as they will be studying this key text as part of their English Literature GCSE. Another group of students, part of the Theatre Club group in school went to see Six the Musical in Central London. Both visits went late into Tuesday evening so many thanks to the staff that gave their time to make sure these visits were successful.

## Geography visits to Stratford, East Village

This week on Wednesday and Thursday the Year 11 students carried out their fieldwork expedition to East Village, centred around the critical themes of mitigating risk and observing change over time. This field trip provided students with an opportunity to explore the dynamic relationship between environmental factors, risk mitigation strategies, and the evolution of a community. The trip included a range of on-site investigations, as well as interviews with local residents to gather valuable insights into how East Village has adapted to mitigate risks over different time periods. Through this experience, students developed their ability to carry out data collection skills but also gain a deeper understanding of the practical applications of geographical concepts in sustainable urban development.

#### Ex-students win Medals at the World Indoor Championships in Glasgow

Two ex-students from the school won bronze medals in the 4x400m relay at the world indoor championships in Glasgow this week. Last year we had both Lina and Laviai Nielsen in school where they delivered an assembly and spoke about their incredible journey and their persistence and resilience as professional athletes. They are perfect examples of our school and the ethos of **excellence**, **resilience** and **inclusion**. Lina this week talked about their journey to get to the finals saying that "People talk about having to travel a rocky road with lots of highs and lows but I feel like we've climbed mountains to be where we are". Their win was unique, as they have never been in the same event and won a medal. This was something they were very proud of and always hoped this would happen. Their dream became a reality.
