

Year 11 Exam Revision Breakfast:

Year 11 has made a superb start to their formal written exams. The dining hall was full of final revision discussions this morning in preparation for GCSE Sociology, supported by the head of department. The room was buzzing with anticipation, and we wished the students success. A reminder that we are putting on revision breakfasts supported by specialist teaching staff before the exams, and we strongly recommend that students come into school for these.

This upcoming week, there will be revision breakfasts for English Literature, RE, Geography, Maths and History prior to their morning exams. In addition to this, the school will aim to timetable revision sessions during lesson 4 slots with the relevant subject teachers prior to afternoon exams; for example, on Monday, Mr Ali will be unning a Computer Science revision session with students from



12pm to 1pm to ensure pupils are able to ask and have answered any last minute questions ahead of their first Computing GCSE exam.

The end of exams will be celebrated with an opportunity for students to sign shirts as they start their goodbyes. Students have asked that we change the planned date for this to **Monday 16th June**, following the final full cohort exam.

Year 9 Students Submit First Drafts for "For Our Mothers" Poetry Project

A small but talented group of Year 9 students have reached an exciting milestone in their involvement with the *For Our Mothers* poetry competition. The students have now submitted the first drafts of their poems to Fin Kennedy, an acclaimed playwright known for his powerful and thought-provoking work.

The poems are centred around maternal figures—whether mothers, grandmothers, carers, or others—who hold a special place in the students' lives. The task was not only a creative challenge but an emotional journey, and the results are nothing short of inspiring. The students' work is heartfelt, reflective, and deeply personal, revealing the strength and significance of these women in their lives.

Year 9 Study Skills Workshop - Friday 2nd May

On Friday 2nd May, our Year 9 students took part in a highly engaging and interactive Study Skills Workshop designed to support their preparation for the upcoming GCSEs. The workshop focused on equipping students with a variety of effective study methods and techniques. Key areas covered included time management and routine building, memory techniques, stress management strategies, and the use of helpful study tools such as flashcards.

What made the session particularly impactful was its hands-on approach. Rather than simply learning about different study methods, students had the opportunity to practice and explore each technique in a fun and interactive way. This allowed them to discover which methods work best for them individually, an especially valuable experience for those who find revision and studying challenging. Much of the workshop was done in teams, encouraging students to collaborate, share ideas, and strengthen their teamwork skills while learning together.

Feedback from students was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing that they found the session both enjoyable and beneficial. One student shared:

"I liked how instead of just teaching us different methods for studying, we actually practiced them in a fun way. I also liked how we tried different methods to see which one is best for us. This helped me a lot since I struggle with revision and studying."

Overall, the Study Skills Workshop proved to be a fantastic opportunity for our Year 9S to develop essential academic and personal skills, and we're proud of the enthusiasm and effort they brought to the day. The facilitator was incredibly impressed with the year group and commented on how they had conducted themselves throughout the session. Their maturity, enthusiasm and exceptional behaviour was very impressive. Well done Year 9, a credit to yourselves.

Rightful Place Conference 2025

On Wednesday 30th April Mulberry Production Arts Academy held their annual Rightful Place conference. A group of Year 9 and 10 students were invited along to witness and contribute to a discussion panel led by Josette Bushell-Mingo, Principal of The Royal Central School of Speech and then participate in workshops led by industry professionals. Year 10 Sociology Visit to JP Morgan with Young Citizens UK
